Public Works

Water Reclamation Facility (WRF) Program Update

The City is making progress on several fronts regarding the Water Reclamation Facility (WRF) program, including nearing completion of design for the advanced treatment facility, permitting the overall program, and working with the state on a low-interest State Revolving Fund (SRF) loan and grant.

WRF Permitting

The California Coastal Commission (CCC) will consider the consolidated Coastal Development Permit (CDP) for the WRF program at its July 11, 2019 meeting. The public meeting will take place at the Embassy Suites in San Luis Obispo, beginning at 9:00a.m. Members of the community are encouraged to either attend the meeting in person and/or submit comments to the Commission on the item by linking to the July 2019 CCC meeting agenda, clicking the July 11 meeting date tab, scrolling to the WRF item (13a) and clicking the "submit comment" link in the project description. Permitting work for water quality is on-going with the State and Regional Water Quality Control Boards. More information to come.

WRF Funding Update

The City received good news on June 18, 2019 in Sacramento. The State Water Board approved its Fiscal Year 2019/20 Intended Use Plan for wastewater and water project funding. The City of Morro Bay's WRF project was approved to be part of the IUP for 2019/20. This means the City is primed to receive up to \$105,000,000 in SRF funding (low-interest loan and a grant of \$5M) in Fiscal Year 2019/20. The City has re-engaged its rate consultant to review the different scenarios on the SRF and WIFIA financing and will work closely with the staff at the State Water Board and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to determine the optimal blend of those financing sources. Based upon this good news, the City is anticipating that it will be able to reduce water/sewer monthly rates by about \$5 to \$10 (more information about the new water/sewer rates that go into effect in August can be found in the Finance section of this report). City staff will analyze the potential rate impacts and present that information to the CFAC and Council once we have more information.

Lastly, the City is completing the last few remaining pieces to finalize the loan agreement with the U.S. Agency on the WIFIA low-interest loan. Once the loan agreement is in place, and if the City receives the permit from the California Coastal Commission and property is acquired for the treatment facility off South Bay Boulevard, WRF construction can begin. City staff estimates that construction could begin as early as September 2019.

Utilities Division

The Utilities Department recently welcomed aboard Operator Chris Nichols, filling a vacant Multiple Certification Operator position. Chris previously worked for the City of San Luis Obispo, received his bachelor's degree from Chico State, and brings extensive equipment operations experience to the City.



Three operators obtained or increased their state wastewater certification. Congratulations to Chad Rocha for obtaining his grade one, Landon Mortimer and Dane Lundy for advancing to grade three. State Certification is a requirement to operate a wastewater treatment plant with grade levels one through five, five being the highest.

Consolidated Maintenance Update - Top Results for the Last Four Weeks

- **Streets**
 - Cut and dig out 6 failed areas of asphalt on the 1300 blk. of Clarabelle and 1300 blk. of Bolton. Base back, compact and pave back with a total of 8.5 tons of Hot Mix Asphalt.
 - Skin patch repairs made with 1 ton of HMA: 1 location on Driftwood/Morro, 2 locations on Zanzibar.
 - Cut and dig out damaged asphalt area at the 500 blk. of Zanzibar. Base, compact and pave back 4 tons of HMA.
 - Cut and dig out a 60' x 24' of failed asphalt on the 400 blk. of Jamaica. Base and compact 96 tons of Class II base flush with street.
 - Installed new pole and ADA parking sign at the 1200 blk. of the Embarcadero parking lot.

- Trimmed bushes out of the bike lane from the 1300-1500 blk. of Quintana and hedges blocking traffic signs on Avalon/Ironwood.
- Installed 32 “4th of July” banners for display on City poles along the Embarcadero.

- **Roundabout**
 - Replaced bad float, timer and water pump at the rock fountain for proper operation.
- **Bayshore Bluffs**
 - Repaired irrigation main line break, replaced vacuum breaker assembly and 2” pipe.
- **714 Embarcadero Parking Lot**
 - Contracted slurry seal, striped standard and ADA parking spaces, walkways, no parking areas and directional arrows.
- **City Park**
 - Repaired toilet flush push button assembly and flush valve assembly in men’s restroom.
- **Cloisters**
 - Replaced hardware on the play structure suspended bridge and platform. Added guardrail where fireman pole was removed.
 - Removed reeds near pond area that had blocked the parking lot outfall.
- **Morro Rock**
 - Installed 8 memorial plaques on concrete benches along Rock and Target Rock lookouts.

 - Rewired 30 light fixtures in front offices, lobby and hallway and replaced T8 bulbs with LED bulbs for LED retrofit saving a total of 850 watts of power. Also installed all new light fixture lenses.
 - Prepped and painted Accounting Manager's office.
- **Public Works**
 - Installed new drip line, wood chips and wood border in south planter.
- **Vets Hall**
 - Installed new low flow sensor faucet in men's restroom.
 - Installed new low flow power flush toilet and water supply fitting in women's restroom.
- **Teen Center**
 - Installed wood kickers to prop up backyard wooden fence along west side.
- **MB Police Building**
 - Patched, textured, primed and painted holes in drywall.
- **MB Community Center**
 - Repaired push bar linkage mechanism in west auditorium door for proper operation and security.
 - Rewired light fixture in men's restroom and replaced bulbs with LED for retrofit.



Finance

Finance – Happy New Fiscal Year from the Finance Team!



The Finance Department is welcoming in the new fiscal year and diligently working to close out Fiscal Year 2018/19 (FY = Fiscal Year). We use this time to reflect back on the past fiscal year and see what we have completed and set our priorities for the new fiscal year. FY 2018/19 was a busy year ... culminating with the most recent adoption of the FY 2019/20 Operating and Capital Budgets. We have also implemented the City's Purchase Order module, adopted a Fiscal Emergency Plan, Adopted Financial Policies and Procedures, were awarded the outstanding budget award for the FY 2017/18 Adopted Operating and Capital budgets, facilitated the fee study update and continue to support the Water Infrastructure Financing Innovation Act (WIFIA) and State Revolving Fund Loan (SRF) processes to help secure low interest financing for the City's Water Reclamation Facility.

There is much work ahead of us in the new Fiscal Year as the Council, Community and Staff navigate new revenue options for the City to help address the future structural budget challenges, examine options to reduce the City's unfunded accrued liability for pension related expenditures, and examine ways to fund deferred capital and infrastructure needs. The City is currently considering engaging a professional consulting firm to assist with community polling and focus groups to determine residents' preferences and choices for services and addressing the structural budget challenges and will also be using the POLCO survey function to obtain resident input. In addition, the City will be hearing about the draft Fee Study update in which the City's Master Fee Schedule has been analyzed to consider updating fees to cost recovery level. The draft Fee Study Update will be heard at July 9, 2019 Council meeting, followed by a series of community outreach meetings before the Council considers adoption of a new fee schedule in late Summer.

Utility Discount Program – The City's Utility Discount Program is available for residents that meet income qualifications, primarily if you are enrolled in PG&E's Care program then you will qualify for the City's Utility Discount Program (UDP). The program offers a 10% discount off a customer's monthly bill. Applications are available at City Hall and on the City's website. Please reach out to City staff if you have any questions or we can assist you in enrolling in this program. Also, every July we remind customers that if you are currently enrolled in the program you must reapply each year to maintain enrollment status. More information on the Utility Discount Program can be found on the City's website and is available in both English and Spanish.

Utility Rate Increases –Effective in July, the City's new water and sewer rates will go into effect, that includes the WRF surcharge (the total utility bill for an average single family home will be \$191/month). You will first see these charges on your August bill, but we want to prepare

people in advance so that you can plan accordingly. The City is working on a new revised bill format that will hopefully be easier to read and understand for our customers. Police

On June 19th, Chief Cox and Sgt. Tony Mosqueda joined Councilmember Dawn Addis in San Luis Obispo at a “Documenting Hate” seminar led by SLO PD. This event focused on law enforcement’s efforts to document and track those incidents of discrimination and hate often expressed to minority groups throughout our country. MBPD is dedicated to addressing those incidents where any of our community members or visitors may be specifically targeted for any reason and we encourage you to contact us immediately if you are a victim of this type of activity.

Chief Cox has announced the formation of the Chief's Advisory Committee. The Committee was created to act as an advisory resource for the Chief in the formation of strategies, development of community policing concepts and increasing public awareness. The committee is intended to provide a forum for discussions concerning community issues and the goal is to have a broad spectrum of viewpoints represented. To carry out its purpose, the committee will address overcoming concerns associated with police-community relations, the improvement of the Morro Bay Police Department's operations, and public safety issues in order to further enhance the quality of life in our community. The CAC will act as a sounding committee for the Chief regarding community needs and concerns, keep the Chief apprised of the community's need for police services, and assist in educating the community at large about the function and role of the Morro Bay Police Department.

On June 26, 2019 approx. 30 youths from the California Cadet Corps of Camp SLO came to tour the Morro Bay Police Department. The youth received a guided tour by Sgt. Mosqueda and got to see first-hand the inner operations of a police department. The Cadets were given the opportunity to interact with several officers, explore police vehicles, motorcycles and other equipment used in the daily operations of police services. The Cadets were provided with several souvenirs and informational brochures before their departure. We wish them all well in their future endeavors.



Harbor

The Harbor Department has welcomed the summer activities and crowds. Several groups have requested Harbor Patrol to give “Dock Talks” on boating safety or maritime opportunities including the Leadership SLO Class, Sealife Stewards, California Cadet Corps, Cuesta College Summer Transportation Institute and of course the Morro Bay Junior Lifeguard program (pictured). The Harbor Patrol conducted dynamic training with the advanced Junior Lifeguard kids with several scenarios of rescue response including a vessel lost in the fog that drifted in through the surf, surf rescue of multiple victims, rock rescue (pictured) and boating hazards.



Beach lifeguards are in full swing out at Morro Rock staffing the towers 7 days a week between 10:30a.m. to 5:30p.m. They have already made several rescues for swimmers or surfers caught in rip currents. Remember to get out of a rip current you need to swim parallel to the beach before trying to swim in.



Sick sea lions have been abundant keeping the Marine Mammal Center busy and the public concerned. Harbor Patrol has been assisting as much as possible but urges the public to keep clear of them as they can be dangerous and aggressive. If you see a sick or injured sea lion please call 805-771-8300 to report it to the Marine Mammal Center. Harbor Patrol also has released several rehabilitated sea birds lately back into the open ocean. Pictured is Harbor Patrol Officer Marcos Green and Lifeguard Kevin McCall releasing a cormorant caught up in fishing line. McCall had to swim in the water to release the line caught in the rocks.

Arrival of WWII P-520 Crash Boat for Independence Week Peaks Patriot Pride



Monday - Friday, July 1 - 5, has been dubbed Patriots' Pride Week for the historic 85-foot long WWII Crash Rescue Boat that will be in the harbor offering tours starting July 1st. Because of this incredible event, Morro Bay has quite a bit of patriot pride and they want to share it with veterans and guests.



About P-520 Crash Rescue Boats

The P-520 Boat is a United States Army Air Forces Crash Rescue Boat from WWII, commonly referred to as "crash boats" since they were intended to retrieve downed pilots and crew. P-520s served on the west coast during WWII and some crash boats were stationed in Morro Bay where they trained infantrymen in landing operations with the Landing Craft Vehicle Personnel (LCVP) or "Higgins" boats. The P-520s were rescue boats not meant for offensive operations, but did carry some armament including two mountable, operational

.50 caliber Browning machine guns in "gun tubs." Physically the boat is 85-feet long, with a 20-foot beam. Crash boats look very much like the famed PT Boats of WWII often shown on the McHale's Navy television show during the 1960's.



This particular P-520 arriving in Morro Bay also served a stint at Avila Beach for a period in 1944 and undoubtedly came into Morro Bay during that time. It was built in Southern California and is the only, fully intact, restored US Crash Boat in the world. The P-520 was restored by the current owner and his late father over the course of 10-12 years. The owner offered to let the Morro Bay Maritime Museum use it as an educational and fundraising platform from the week of 4th of July through the Annual Morro Bay Harbor Festival the first weekend of October.

Docked between the Great American Fish Company and the Harbor Hut on the north end of the Embarcadero, WWII P-520 Crash Boat tour tickets will be available at the Morro Bay Maritime Museum for \$5 - \$7 starting Monday, July 1, 2019. Fire

Fireworks in Morro Bay



The Fourth of July is approaching and the City of Morro Bay will be hosting citywide events celebrating Independence Day. This festive holiday draws numerous visitors to the Morro Bay community. Morro Bay public safety professionals want to remind our community and visitors about firework safety and the permitted and prohibited use of fireworks.

The City of Morro Bay Municipal Code 14.08.090 permits the use of "safe and sane" fireworks on private property within the City limits. **Fireworks are not permitted on public property such as our parking lots, our parks, or our beaches.** All uses of "dangerous fireworks" are prohibited within our City which include bottle rockets, aerial shells, firecrackers, and sky lanterns. The California Health and Safety Code, Section 12505, defines "dangerous fireworks," as fireworks that does not have the State Fire Marshal's "safe and sane" seal placed on it

As per Morro Bay Municipal Code 14.08.090, any use of illegal fireworks in Morro Bay or improper use of “safe and sane” fireworks in Morro Bay will result in a \$1,000 citation including first time offenses.

Fire Marshal, Matthew Vierra states, “People who use illegal fireworks are a danger to themselves, their friends and their communities. There are plenty of alternatives for celebrating the 4th of July safely without using bottle rockets, aerial shells and other illegal pyrotechnics that can cause injuries and damage property.” In 2018, about 9,000 people in our nation were treated in hospital emergency rooms for injuries associated with fireworks with most occurring during the week of July 4th. Children and young adults under the age of 20 years old accounted for 46 percent of the estimated injuries. “Safe and sane” fireworks should be used only with extreme caution. Older children should be closely supervised, and younger children should not be allowed to play with fireworks, including sparklers.



Members of the Morro Bay Fire, Harbor, and Police Departments will be working with our community ensuring public safety during this year's July 4th celebration. We will have numerous officers, firefighters, and harbor personnel patrolling our City streets and our beaches assisting with citywide celebratory events. We are hopeful everyone will be safe with lawful fireworks and will comply with the provisions of the municipal code and have a safe fun-filled July 4th celebration.

The Morro Bay Fire Department wishes you and your family a very safe July 4th celebration. Safe and Sane Fireworks are allowed on private property in Morro Bay. NO Fireworks on public property such as our parking lots, parks, and beaches. Any Fireworks that do not have our State's Safe and Sane seal on the device are illegal. Any use of illegal Fireworks or misuse of Safe and Sane Fireworks will result in a citation and a fine of \$1,000;

even first-time offenses. For you and your neighbor's safety, please use the following precautions:

DO:

- ONLY Safe and Sane Fireworks
- Have an adult present at all times
- Light one at a time, then move away quickly
- Assign an adult "Shooter" to light your family's fireworks
- Keep others at a safe distance
- Keep fire an extinguishing agent within 100 feet, (fire extinguisher, garden hose, bucket of water)
- Use only outdoors and on your private property, never inside a structure
- Maintain a minimum of 10 feet clearance from all residential dwellings or other structures
- Place fountains or other spark emitting fireworks upright on a concrete, asphalt or other hard level surface
- Douse spent fireworks into a bucket of water before discarding

DON'T:

- DON'T use illegal fireworks, \$1,000 fine!
- DON'T use any fireworks on public property, \$1,000 fine!
- Never point or throw fireworks at another person
- Do not elevate fireworks on to any surface above ground level (no ladders, stand, etc)
- Never hold lit fireworks in your hand



The City has a new Firefighter Paramedic



The Morro Bay Fire Department is pleased to announce the hiring of Andrew Schechter as a Firefighter Paramedic.
