The City is preparing the draft budget for next fiscal year (FY 2021/2022), with the central theme of resilience. It has been quite a roller coaster year, with many financial ups and downs. The COVID-19 pandemic impacted public health, our daily lives, our local economy, and City budget. When we put the budget together last year, we anticipated a significant reduction in consumer-based tax revenues (transient occupancy and sales taxes) as well as recreation program revenues. We planned accordingly and took quick action to reduce expenses, through employee concessions on compensation, zeroing out training and travel budgets and other miscellaneous costs, and reduced positions in virtually every department, in addition to responsibly drawing down our financial reserves. It has been a trying time in the City. The City Council and staff gave it their all to continue to meet the needs of the community, while also keeping our community and employees safe, despite the cutbacks in resources and staff.

Fast-forward from that tough year to today, and we are in the midst of a strong economic rebound on the road to a full recovery. City revenues are keeping pace with pre-COVID-19 years, the Federal Government is providing direct financial assistance to all cities, including Morro Bay, cannabis revenue is coming in, and the passage of Measure E is bringing a much-needed boost to our coffers. This rebound presents the City with an opportunity to replenish our financial reserves *and* strategically replace staff positions in Public Works, Police, Fire, Community Development and Administrative Services and address employee compensation needs. The FY 2021/2022 Proposed Budget will be presented to the Citizen Finance Advisory Committee on the afternoon of May 18th and then on to City Council the afternoon of May 25th and May 26th for review. We hope you are able to watch and participate in the budget process. In conjunction with the new budget, the City will begin the Council goal process in August/September. More to come, stay tuned!

COVID-19 Update



We continue to operate our Emergency Operations Center (EOC) for the last **414 days**, to support the Emergency Declarations from our City, County, State, and President. We continue to function under a two-week operational period with your EOC staff meeting twice weekly. Our City staff and volunteers continues to work closely with San Luis Obispo County Public Health Department, our County's EOC, helping our workforce, volunteers, and citizens reduce the spread of COVID-19.

Recently we have entered in the "Orange" phase allowing for increased indoor activities for our restaurants and retail businesses. Our City Fire Paramedics are continuing to be utilized to support our three County Vaccine Centers in Paso Robles, Arroyo Grande, and Cuesta College. We are

continuing the reimbursement process that has been developed in partnership with the County hopefully be funded soon.

Our Public Services leading our FEMA reimbursement process and a recent the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 has created hope for additional assistance to our community and reimbursement to our City for our year plus effort to limit COVID-19 spread in our community. In addition, the American Rescue Act will provide funds to the City to offset revenue losses experienced from the pandemic.

Our EOC staff develops and communicates a new Incident Action Plan (IAP) every two weeks to keep us aligned with our County's collaborative partners and to ensure our actions and efforts are focused on serving, safeguarding, and protecting our community, City employees, and volunteers while we are returning to our way of life. Our EOC staff comprises of our City staff, business representatives, and community volunteers.

City staff are developing plans for re-opening City Hall and other City offices with modified hours and providing a pathway for in-person and/or hybrid in-person/virtual City Council and advisory board and commission meetings. A lot will be involved in making the re-opening successful, including having sufficient staffing and technology in place. No definitive dates have been set for this re-opening effort, and staff will provide updates to the public and City Council in the coming weeks.

Fire



Help our Firefighters prepare for Fire Season by clearing weeds and debris

It is that time of the year again, and residents of Morro Bay are encouraged to get an early start on weed abatement. The Morro Bay Fire Department mission, through its Weed and Vegetation Abatement program, is to eliminate vegetative growth or refuse which may constitute a fire or life and safety hazard. The weather in May and June varies greatly from year to year and rain can be common after property owners have cut their parcels. However, it is important to the overall safety of our community that property owners maintain their weeds/seasonal grass to 4" in length, year-round so we can prevent small fires from becoming large. The following is our community's Abatement Guidelines for all properties:



- *Clear annual grasses and weeds on empty lots to no more than 4" high by mowing; no disking or rototilling is not permitted.*
- *Remove dead bushes, tree limbs, excess trash, wood, and other combustibles.*
- *All cuttings within 10' of adjoining properties, streets or sidewalks must be removed and sidewalks, gutter and street areas shall be left clean. No piles or clumps shall be left on the property and street areas.*

Fire Department Personnel will start inspecting all properties starting June 16th.

Firefighters prepare and train for possible Trench or Confined Space Rescue

With the current construction of our new Wastewater Treatment Plant, trenches and confined holes are being constructed throughout our community. Just like many hazards we may have, the Fire Department is continuing preparation for any needed rescue of a trapped person in a constructed trench, hole, or confined space. Due to the inherent dangers associated with large scale digging operations, the Fire Department will be applying State Fire Marshal and Cal OSHA compliant operations in partnership with the construction company performing the work.

Trench and confined space collapses generally occur due to unstable soil conditions that overcomes the constructed shoring. The potential for additional collapse while emergency operations are performed is high and is considered a primary hazard to all personnel. Removing soil or debris, adding weight near the edge of an open cut, vibration, rain, or simply the passage of time, may cause additional collapse at any during any possible rescue operation.

Fire Department personnel is working along with the construction company creating performance standards for many locations in our community with the purpose to establish guidelines for the emergency response and equipment needed at many locations. The Fire Department built a trench rescue prop at our Harbor Department storage yard to exercise our hydraulic rams, speed shores, rope rescue, pneumatic air bags, and patient retrieval equipment. You can anticipate seeing our Firefighters training with our prop and in the actual trenches for the next three months.



Harbor

LIFEGUARD SEASON

Summer is right around the corner, and with it comes the return of the Beach Lifeguard and Junior Lifeguard programs. The Harbor Department will be hosting a United States Lifesaving Association Ocean Lifeguard I training academy starting April 30 and May 1-2, then again on May 7-9. This 40-hour training will prepare new Beach Lifeguard recruits and Junior Lifeguard staff for the basics of beach, ocean and surf safety and rescue. While organized and headed by Harbor Department staff, members the Morro Bay Recreation Department as well as the Cayucos/County lifeguards assist with the academy.

SALMON FISHING

With spring brings the return of King salmon, and the recreational fishers have been seeing decent numbers since the fishery opened on April 3. Only two fish per person per day are allowed to be landed using barbless hooks, with a minimum length of 24-inches through May 15, and 20-inches thereafter. Salmon fishers slowly troll a variety of things to entice salmon to bite, including large shiny “flashers” with lures of various types behind the flasher including dead bait fish, colored spoons or “hoochie” lures, which resemble small, colored squids. Salmon fishing is as much an art as it is a science, and every fisher has their sworn (and secret) setups. The season goes until September 30, although by mid-summer the bite is usually over. The commercial salmon season starts May 1.



COAST GUARD BUILDING EXPANSION PROJECT

The US Coast Guard’s Station Morro Bay building expansion project has been moving right along since starting last fall. The vast majority of the work was in moving all major utilities that formerly ran under the expansion footprint. That work has been completed, and concrete curb, gutter, drainage and parking pours are largely done as well. The 800-square foot expansion is framed, sided and roofed, and exterior finish work begun. The project is on schedule to be completed on the exterior by the Memorial Day weekend, including paving the remainder of the parking lot adjacent and opening that area back up to traffic. Interior fit and finish work will likely take a couple more months after that.

NEW HARBOR PATROL VESSEL

The Harbor Department’s acquisition of Port San Luis’s surplus 26-foot Radon patrol vessel is nearing reality. Port San Luis’s replacement vessel is now in service, and they are ready to relinquish the Radon. The vessel is being purchased with a \$85,000 grant from the California Division of Boating and Waterways, with repowering, refitting and other work being funded from a variety of sources including the Harbor Equipment Replacement Fund, Harbor Operating

Fund, Measure E funds and Friends of the Morro Bay Harbor Department fund-raising donations. Of their \$100,000 goal, to-date the Friends have generated over \$50,000 from the very generous support of our community, including Supervisor Gibson.

ARMY CORPS OF ENGINEERS DREDGE SHIP YAQUINA COMING

It's that time of year again! The Army Corps of Engineers dredge ship YAQUINA is scheduled to arrive Saturday May 8, for her annual harbor dredging. She will be here through June 1. Dredging will be concentrated in the harbor entrance to ensure our harbor is safely passable during winter months and high surf, although some interior dredging to about the Coleman area may take place. Mariners are reminded that most of the interior harbor channel markers from the entrance to the North T Pier are removed for the dredging, and therefore the navigation channel is not marked. The ship is tentatively scheduled to be tied up at the North T pier on May 18 and June 1 for crew changed and fueling at the fuel dock the days prior, May 17 & May 31.

Lisa will be working in the office with clerical duties.



Police Department Support Services

- **Property and Evidence Audit**

- At the direction of Chief Cox, an evidence audit was performed by an outside evidence inventory agency (Key Evidence). The audit took three weeks and inventoried various items which are stored at the police department. The audit inventoried approximately 2,300 pieces of evidence. Overall, the inventory showed the department continues to maintain proper storage and documentation of property and evidence.

Training and Development

- **Morro Bay Police Department Completes P.O.S.T. Team Building Workshop**

- P.O.S.T. Team Building Workshop is a 24-hour, P.O.S.T. sponsored workshop geared toward helping police departments enhance teamwork, improve internal and external communication, enhance/define role development for supervisors and managers, discuss leadership traits, create an action plan for goals and objectives for the future, review the department's current strategic plan and establish framework for future strategic planning, and much more. This month, the department took a group of 10 employees, sworn and professional staff, to Monterey for three days of classroom team building, discussions, and leadership development.



Public Works

New Public Works Director – Greg Kwolek

The City Manager recently announced the hiring of new Public Works Director, Greg Kwolek. Greg joins the City of Morro Bay Public Works team on Monday, May 10. Greg most recently worked as a Division Manager for the City of Pasadena, and as management analyst for the Public Works Department at the City of Flintridge – La Canada, California. We are excited to bring Greg aboard, where he will focus on learning about our community and City and begin planning for the next series of capital improvements in Morro Bay. Water Reclamation Facility (WRF) Program Update

The City is making progress on all components of the [Water Reclamation Facility \(WRF\) project](#), with construction on the advanced treatment facility and the pipeline/conveyance system components of the project underway, advance study moving forward on the injection well system, and staff working with the State government to complete agreements for the Clean Water State Revolving Fund (CWSRF) grant and low-interest loan funding. The City will likely experience increased costs on the overall project as a result of project modifications as well as unanticipated issues that delayed initial construction of the pipeline. These issues will be discussed during the Fiscal Year 2021/2022 Budget discussions. However, proposed increases will not impact the water and sewer rates for Morro Bay customers.

WRF Funding Update

The City received approvals for a loan amount of \$61 million from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) for its Water Infrastructure Financing Innovation Act (WIFIA) low-interest loan program. That loan was locked in with a near historic low interest rate of under 0.9%, which will save the City and community \$800,000 to \$900,000 a year in debt costs compared to a conventional loan. That allows the City to maintain water and sewer rates that are on par or lower than our neighboring communities.

City staff and California State Revolving Fund (CWSRF) staff have nearly completed the process to secure the City and its rate payers an additional \$61 million low-interest loan and \$5 million grant. The WIFIA and CWSRF loans and grant significantly reduce the total debt paid on the WRF project and will also help pay for the potable reuse portion of the project. Potable reuse will become increasingly necessary as the State appears to be headed into another prolonged drought. The CWSRF loan and grant process has been delayed due to COVID-19 but is anticipated to conclude by the end of Fiscal Year 2020/2021, to be reviewed by City Council.

The City also applied for a federal grant of up to \$20 million through the Bureau of Reclamation Title XVI “WaterSmart” program. This is a very competitive program, but the WRF innovative aspects make it a strong competitor for a funding award.

Pipeline/Conveyance System Construction Update

The City signed a contract with Anvil, Inc. to construct the pipeline/conveyance system to connect to the advanced treatment plant, outfall and indirect potable reuse injection systems.



The \$31.5 million contract includes construction of two wastewater pipelines, one pipeline for the water treatment process discharge, and one purified water pipeline. The four pipelines will be constructed in segments on Atascadero Road, Main Street, Quintana Road and South Bay Boulevard. The construction will include trenching, tunneling, pipe installation, soil backfilling and off hauling, and road restoration, as well as construction of support infrastructure including two new lift stations.

In March, crews began pipeline construction on Quintana Road moving southeast from La Loma to South Bay Boulevard. Crews will also begin work at Main Street and Quintana Road moving southeast along Quintana Road on May 10th and work their way toward the Roundabout over the next several months. Construction is scheduled on weekdays from 7 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Weekend or night work may be scheduled, as needed, but neighboring properties will be informed in advance of schedule changes. The schedule calls for the majority of construction activities to be completed by December 2021/early 2022. Consolidated Maintenance Update

City Council recently approved an additional \$25,000 in spending (from the Tourism Fund and General Fund) to hire more part-time maintenance staff for restroom cleaning and trash service in the waterfront and beach areas for the peak visitor season (April – October). Two new members were hired to fill out these positions in April, and they are focusing their time on the most impacted waterfront/beach areas Friday – Sunday each week.

- Re-striped top of curb line from Olive St. to Bayshore Dr. with white paint.

- Installed new composite wood bench seat and anchored on the 200 blk. of MB Blvd.
- Tractor graded a level pad foundation for tool shed container at the Bike Park.

We hope to have some type of soft opening of the center sometime this summer followed by a more robust welcome back party. He will also take on the very popular static medical equipment loaning program.
