COVID-19 Update

Our City staff and volunteers continue to work closely with San Luis Obispo County Public Health Department, our County's EOC, helping our workforce, volunteers, and citizens to reduce the spread of COVID-19. The number of daily cases of COVID-19 have risen slightly in recent weeks, with no changes to overall protocols.

The current California Department of Public Health face mask guidance strongly recommends but no longer requires individuals mask in indoor public settings. As of April 10th, the requirement for masking on public transit and in transportation hubs has been lifted. Masks are still required for all individuals regardless of vaccination status in hospitals, homeless shelters, correctional facilities, healthcare facilities and long-term care facilities. While the mask mandate has been lifted, folks may choose to continue to wear them. For those who have questions about which masks are most effective, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has a helpful [resource](#).

The COVID-19 testing sites in San Luis Obispo and Paso Robles are open Monday – Friday from 7:00 am to 7:00 pm, closed for lunch and dinner from 11 am - noon and 4:00 pm - 5:00 pm. The Grover Beach test site is available those same hours Monday – Thursday (closed on Fridays). Learn more at <https://www.slocounty.ca.gov/COVID-19.aspx>.

City Hall, the Shasta building (Community Development and Public Works) and the Harbor Office are opened with modified hours Monday through Thursday (8:00 am to 12:00 pm). The Police and Fire administration buildings will remain open during normal business hours. Recreation Services at the Community Center is open Monday – Friday, 9:00 am – 1:00 pm and the Senior Center is open Monday – Friday 9:00 am – 4:00 pm. The City has transitioned to hybrid City Council and advisory board meetings where members of the public can join us at the Veterans Hall or view meetings and provide public comment via Zoom.

SLO County and cities within the region, including Morro Bay, are encouraging members of the community to take advantage of vaccines and booster shots. The vaccines are safe, effective, and free for all members of the community ages 5 and up. All three COVID-19 vaccines and boosters effectively prevent severe illness, hospitalization, and death. ✓ **San Luis Obispo Regional SWAT Team Train at Vistra Energy Power Plant**

On April 13th, the San Luis Obispo Regional SWAT Team held their monthly training at the Vistra Energy property in Morro Bay. Team members utilized the property to train for several scenarios that could be encountered by the team. ✓ **Department Increases Traffic Monitoring and Enforcement after Increase in Community Complaints**

Over the past few months, the MBPD has received numerous complaints related to speeding in our neighborhoods. The department continues to use our digital message boards reminding drivers to slow down, drive safely, and watch their speeds. Since the first of the year, the department has sent several of the newer officers to the lidar/radar speed enforcement training to provide them the tools and training required by the state to utilize radar enforcement. As calls for service and staffing allow, the community can expect to see officers using radar to cite drivers who are speeding on our city streets.

Fire

Fire Chief Update

The Fire Department responded to 147 incidents in the month of March. Of those we responded to

- 2 Fires
- 85 EMS incidents
- 3 Hazardous Condition
- 21 Service Calls/ PSA
- 26 Good Intent/ Cancelled
- 10 False Alarms


In preparation for the upcoming fire season, we are in the process of recruiting three (3) Seasonal Firefighters that will work until the end of October. These Seasonal Firefighters will assist with business inspections, fire prevention activities, and participate in Mutual Aid responses.

Department members continue to focus on training, we sent Captain Hasch and Engineer Kelly to the National Fire Academy in Emmitsburg Maryland for Emergency Operations Center training with other participants from San Luis Obispo County. Engineer Watson participated in the FMC Water Rescue Technician course hosted by Cambria Fire. Multiple other department members participated in the Fire investigator and Fire Instructor Courses recently held in Paso Robles.

The Fire Department responded to a residential structure fire on Bernardo Street. There were no injuries reported and crews were able to limit spread into the living area of the home. One adjacent home suffered damage to the exterior siding and windows.

Fire Marshal Update

The annual weed abatement program is in effect. Residents have until June 1st, 2022 to clear all weeds and hazard fuels from their properties. Information can be found on the city website.



Harbor

Harbor Patrol statistics for March and April, 2022 were 21 emergency responses, 208 calls for service, 80 assists of other agencies, 60 enforcement contacts, 135 bay patrols, 439 land patrols, 311 maintenance actions, 26 weather warnings, and six hazardous bar warnings. With the opening of Recreational Fishing on April 1st and Commercial Salmon season on May 1st more boating activity has been apparent in Morro Bay. Here is a sampling of activity for the months of March and April 2022:

3/12/22

Harbor Patrol responded to a report of a climber on the Rock. The climber was escorted down by Morro Bay Fire and State Parks. Harbor Patrol also rescued a Cal Poly student from the water off of the North T- Pier and relocated her and her paddleboard to Coleman Beach.

3/20/22

Harbor Patrol responded to a report of an eight-year-old kayaker who was separated from their kayaking group. Patrol located the girl near the State Park Marina and reunited her with her family.

4/2/22

Harbor Patrol was informed of individual with a broken hip on a recreational fishing vessel which was four hours away, motoring down from Piedras Blancas. Harbor Patrol and Morro Bay Fire stood by at the vessel's slip for the patient's arrival and assisted with unloading the patient from the vessel to the ambulance for transport to a local hospital.

4/9/22

Harbor Patrol was dispatched to Pacific and Embarcadero for medical aid of an unresponsive female, who was possibly intoxicated. Patrol staff assisted Morro Bay Fire with IV fluids and loading patient into an ambulance for transportation to a local hospital.

Safety Talk

On March 30, Harbor Patrol Supervisor Kelly held a special safety meeting at the Morro Bay Yacht Club for local waterfront businesses who rent equipment to the public for use on Morro Bay waters, or who operate bay cruise or other in-bay passenger-for-hire operations including organizations with regular participants on the water. This meeting is designed to assist businesses with their safety lectures given to the public when renting out equipment in the busy summer season. Guest speakers included USCG, Morro Bay State Parks, Sea Otter Savvy with discussions between Fish and Wildlife Wardens and Biologists.



Patrol Boat 3869 Retrofit Update

The patrol boat refit project continues at Radon Boats in Goleta. The work raising the cabin roof has been completed and looks great (our 6'5" patrol officer will fit nicely). The helm console has been blanked out to accommodate the installation of navigational equipment and radios. Also, the placement of the small pedestal on which the main engine throttle controls are mounted was checked and found satisfactory (a very important factor to Harbor Department personnel since so many different people operate the boat).



The fire pump and its drive motor have been received and fit into the boat. The pump/motor set sits into the boat's center hold better than originally anticipated. Radon removed a hydraulic tank that was built into the hull, which allows the pump to sit farther aft and lower down in the compartment – an important factor in the overall weight distribution and stability of the boat. The size of the hatch opening over the pump compartment has been determined. The decision was made to widen and lengthen the existing hatch significantly to allow ample room to service the fire pump, as well as to provide convenient storage for supplies. This will also allow for a more even deck surface outside the main cabin door to ease entry and exit for crew members. Along the lines of increasing serviceability of the fire pump, a proposed watertight bulkhead between the main engine compartment and the fire pump compartment was altered to have two removable watertight hatches added to it, which will allow access to the front accessory area of the fire pump's drive motor.



In the main engine compartment, the only needed modifications were to the hull stringers to accommodate the mounts for the new main propulsion engines. That work has been completed. Significantly, the new engines have finally arrived at the local dealer, after weeks of delay and waiting. Global supply chain issues have played a significant factor in slowing the progress of the project, and more unplanned impacts may occur before the project is complete. Fortunately, the Harbor Department has already taken delivery of all the boat's navigation and communications equipment. The Harbor Department's best estimate for taking delivery of the completed boat is now late July.

Division of Boating and Waterways - Marine Law Enforcement Rescue Boat Operations

March 21 to March 25, two Harbor Patrol Reserved staff members attended a five day, 40-hour POST certified course for marine patrol officers who operate emergency response boats under varying conditions down in Los Angeles, CA. This course will cover emergency response operations, towing, offshore operations, and search & recovery. The POST course title is 'Boating: Rescue Boat Operation', presenter #9400, course #20250.* Prerequisite: Students must have completed basic boat operator training (e.g. Basic Maritime Officer's course, Inland Boat Operations, or have twelve months of marine patrol experience).

The Division of Boating and Waterways (DBW) Marine Law Enforcement Training Program provides training courses statewide to local law enforcement officers, harbor patrol officers, lifeguards, and other first responders that work in a marine patrol environment.





National Safe Boating Week: May 21-27, 2022

Reminding all boaters to brush up on boating safety skills and prepare for the boating season. This observance week is the annual kick-off of the Safe Boating Campaign, a global awareness effort that encourages boaters to make the most of their boating adventure by being responsible. The Safe Boating Campaign is produced under a grant from the Sports Fish Restoration and Boating Trust Fund and administered by the U.S. Coast Guard. It's official Ex-Patrol Vessel 3866 is up for auction. SLOCAL Estate Auctions, Inc has listed the 1995 Radoncraft model, made by Davis Boats, with its 1999 Pacific galvanized two-axle trailer. The Ex-Harbor Patrol vessel, is being sold as-is. The engine does not currently run but ran when the vessel was stored in 2018. Hours on the engine and outdrive are unknown due to numerous re-powers over the lifetime of the vessel. This vessel and trailer should be viewed before bidding. SLOCAL Estate Auctions, Inc has listed the surplus waterfront RV camping program items which are no longer needed by the Harbor Department. Administration (Finance and IT)

Budget Development

The City Finance team is hard at work developing the Citywide budget for fiscal year 2022-23, which will run from July 1-June 30. The Citizens Finance Advisory Committee provided input on the expenditure of Measure Q&E local sales tax revenues at their meeting on April 28th, and those funds will continue to support public safety and cleanliness, including related infrastructure investments. The broader budget will be discussed by City Council at public Budget Study Sessions on May 24th and 25th. The public is encouraged to review the draft proposed budget, which will be available mid-May, and provide comments to Council at or in advance of the Budget Study Sessions.

Expanded Business License and Transient Occupancy Tax Customer Service Options

The City has always valued its relationship with the business community and the lodging community, and we are pleased to announce some changes to our business tax procedures and transient Occupancy Tax (TOT) procedures that are designed to streamline the process for remitting fees or taxes to the City. The City has contracted with the HdL Companies to provide assistance to the business and lodging communities for all of their business tax and TOT remittance and support needs. Beginning next week, as of May 2, 2022, the HdL Business Support Center will provide the business community with support for all aspects of business tax. The HdL Tax Processing Center the lodging community with support for all aspects of TOT; including return filing, payment, compliance, and general support. Starting in May, instead of filing applications and remittances directly with the City, businesses and lodging entities will now fill directly with HdL, and may file via mail, email, online, or by phone to provide expanded customer service options. Phone support will be available Monday through Friday 8am-5pm PST at (805) 339-2649, email support is available by emailing MorroBay@hdlgov.com, and a new web site will be created and available next week at <https://morrobay.hdlgov.com>. City staff will remain available for questions as needed.

Public Works

Utilities Division

On Monday, April 11th City Utility operators discovered evidence of a wastewater leak in a 6" force main running from a lift station in the Cloisters area under Highway 1 to Main Street. The operators isolated the leak and cleaned the area the same day the issue was discovered. They also diverted all wastewater away from the pipe and into temporary storage tanks, which stopped further leaking on the same day. Due to the quick actions of the operators, all sewage was contained and no sewage travelled to Cloisters Pond or the ocean.



On Wednesday, April 27th a City contractor completed insertion of a smaller 4' High Density Poly Ethylene (HDPE) through the entire length of the force main, which has allowed the force main to go back into operation. This is a short-term fix that will prevent any further leakages until the Utilities and Engineering Divisions evaluate and implement long-term options to replace the force main.

The City has directed the temporary storage tanks along the bike path to be fully emptied and removed from site. Further, the bike path that runs through the area has now been reopened.

Maintenance & Operations

The Maintenance Division has recently replaced six truncated dome panels throughout the City's downtown area and will continue replacing more old and worn out panels in the coming weeks. Truncated domes serve as a detectable warning since they can be seen, felt, and heard. They are put in place to increase the accessibility of sidewalks.

Transit



Next month Morro Bay Transit will be celebrating its 45th anniversary! The City Council established a general public transit system in Morro Bay that began operating May 2, 1977. It was designed to provide local transit service to individuals who did not have access to or were unable to drive a car because of age, medical condition, economic circumstances, or personal choice. Over the 45 years since local transit service began operating, Morro Bay Transit has provided more than 1.67 million rides to residents and visitors. At its April 26 meeting, the City Council approved a proclamation

declaring May 2 through May 6, 2022 as "Morro Bay Transit Week" in acknowledgement and appreciation of the service provided to residents and visitors by Morro Bay Transit contractors and their respective drivers since inception in 1977. Engineering

The Engineering Division recently submitted applications for two separate grants funded through the California Department of Parks and Recreation. One of the grant applications is for improvements to Franklin Riley Park in the amount of \$20,000 from the Trail Habitat Conservation Fund (HCF). The second grant application was for the Rural Recreation & Tourism Program (RRT) requesting \$937,432 in funding for the Coleman Park improvements. With limited availability of general fund finances, grants are an important part of funding stream that Engineering looks to for infrastructure and public facility improvements. We are hopeful the City will receive these much-needed funds so these projects can move forward.



Water Reclamation Facility

Construction of the WRF continues to progress well, and Filanc Black & Veatch (FBV) has completed installation and individual testing of all major wastewater treatment equipment. FBV is now working on testing the equipment as an entire system by circulating clean water through the completed portions of the WRF, and the City's operations staff is being trained by the designers and equipment vendors while working alongside FBV during this testing period. Construction of curbs and gutters and pavement subgrade continues, and site paving is planned for May. Hydroseeding and revegetation of pre-existing grasslands around the WRF perimeter is progressing well. The program management team is currently working with City operations staff, FBV, and Anvil Builders on further developing the detailed plan to start up the WRF and Conveyance Facilities as an entire system, which is planned to occur in October.



Conveyance Project

Anvil Builders continues to have multiple crews working around the city and they are making good progress. One pipeline crew completed the work on South Bay Boulevard and it was reopened on April 29. In mid-May, a pipeline crew will continue water main and purified water line construction on Quintana Road between South Bay Boulevard and the roundabout. That work is expected to continue until mid-summer, and Las Tunas is anticipated to be reopened by the end of June. Another pipeline crew completed the pipeline within the Vistra property and has moved to the bike path, and the pipe bridge abutment excavation was completed in early April and the pipe bridge is on track to be completed by the fall. Construction of both pump stations is progressing well, and sewer main relocation work will commence in the next week near the pump station on Main Street. Pipeline construction on Atascadero Road is also planned to begin in June.


Events
