## COVID-19 Update

The [COVID-19 testing sites](#) in San Luis Obispo and Grover Beach, and Paso Robles remain open Monday – Friday from 7:00 am to 7:00 pm, closed for lunch and dinner from 11 am - noon and 4:00 pm - 5:00 pm. The Grover Beach test site is available those same hours Monday – Thursday (closed on Fridays). The Paso Robles testing site has been moved to the Paso Robles Train Station located at 800 Pine Street.

The Public Health Department is hosting pop-up clinics in early November at various locations in the county to protect residents from influenza and COVID-19. The clinics will provide flu shots and the new, updated COVID-19 booster shots (sometimes called “Omicron boosters”) at no cost to residents. As a CSO, Miguel will be working hard taking non-emergency police reports, non-injury traffic collisions, handling municipal code violations, as well as many other duties as assigned. ### **Morro Bay PD Citizen Academy Graduation**

October 27<sup>th</sup> marked the ninth and final session of the 2022 MBPD Citizen Academy. Over the course of the nine sessions, participants were introduced to many facets of the Morro Bay Police Department. Instruction topics included a brief history of law enforcement in America, history of Morro Bay Police, Support Services Division (Property/Evidence, Records Management, Training Unit), the department Explorer program, laws of arrest, use of force, traffic unit, narcotics investigations, SWAT Team operations, sUAS (drone) demonstration, District Attorney's Office along with victim/witness services, homeless outreach team, school resource officer, investigations division, the Morro Bay Fire and Harbor Department operations, field training program, chaplain/volunteer program, and the firearms simulator with tactical scenario training.

In total, 27 hours of instruction was provided to nine academy participants. The sessions were instructed by department personnel, which gives the participants the opportunity to ask questions directly to the staff and officers who perform the job daily. Thank you to our 2022 graduates for taking the time to join us and learn about the why behind what we do in law enforcement and here in Morro Bay.



### **Morro Bay PD Attempts First Ever Pop-Up Haunted House**

MBPD joined City Recreation Services at the 8<sup>th</sup> Annual Morro Bay Trick or Treat event on October 29<sup>th</sup> in downtown Morro Bay. Morro Bay PD worked hard to put together the first ever pop-up haunted house. Thanks to Pizza Port for allowing the PD to take over their parking lot to build the haunted house using five pop-up canopies and over 200 feet of heavy black tarp to create the spook-tastic experience for Morro Bay thrill seekers. The haunted house included a deadly spider room, a sensory room, a chain saw toting clown room, and a dead body room, to entice those who dared to be frightened. MBPD staff and volunteers set up the haunt in four hours and stuck around to scare some trick or treaters.



## Fire Chief Update

The Fire Department responded to 181 incidents from October 1st through October 31<sup>st</sup>. The department has seen a 5% increase in calls for service from January 1<sup>st</sup> through October 31<sup>st</sup> compared to the same time period of 2021. Of those October incidents we responded to

- 3 Fires
- 1 Explosion/overpressure/ Overheat (no fire)
- 126 EMS incidents
- 10 Hazardous Condition
- 20 Service Calls/ PSA
- 12 Good Intent/ Cancelled
- 9 False Alarms
- 0 Special Incident/Other

## Mutual Aid

The Fire Department has been participating in the Mutual Aid Response to fires in California. Engineer Hoese, Engineer Watson and Captain Talmadge were all assigned as a Fireline Paramedics on the Mosquito Fire in the Lake Tahoe area. Division Chief Vierra was part of the Incident Management Team acting as the Finance Section Chief on the Mosquito Fire.

## Fire Marshal Update

Black Hill State Park will begin conducting their annual prescribed fire program for vegetation management, fuel load reduction and structure protection to the surrounding residence in the area. The State Parks works closely with the local Air Pollution Control District and Morro Bay Fire Department to reduce these hazards associated with drought and bug kill in tree mortality areas. By reducing dead and downed trees and slash piles, enhance the health of the native plant communities, and increase the defensible space with our residences adjacent to the State Park. The Morro Bay Fire Department will monitor smoke, and noise concerns at the site and assist with staffing as needed. Burning will not occur if a burn ban is in effect or if the weather or brush conditions are not conducive to burning. ## Community Outreach

The Fire Department is hosting the annual Season of Hope toy and food drive now through December 16<sup>th</sup>. We are collecting non-perishable food items, as well as new unwrapped toys. There are collection bins in the front lobby of the fire station. The toys will be distributed by Operation Santa Claus, and the food will be distributed by the San Luis Obispo Food Bank.



## Community Education

Fire Department personnel participated in fire prevention week doing demonstrations about fire safety to approximately 325 students at the Del Mar School. They covered topics such as smoke detectors; Stop, Drop, and Roll; fire safety, burn treatment, and familiarization of firefighting equipment. The Morro Bay Firefighters Association also donated \$750 to the Alisa Ann Ruch Burn Foundation.

### Beach Lifeguard Statistics for 2022 Season

Beach Lifeguard season wrapped up in early October and the towers were removed from the beach. Lifeguards had 1,224 contacts recorded with the public, gave 704 safety lectures, and had an estimated beach patron count of 108,258 people for the season. They assisted 351 people in the water this summer and only had one true rescue – a testament to their preventive actions. We are so proud of our Beach Lifeguards and the job they do.



### Coastal Cleanup

Harbor Patrol has continued to clean up the coastal access below the Bayshore Bluffs Park. The shore is lined with kayaks, canoes and other miscellaneous paddle craft, in addition to a fair amount of debris. While this is a free place to store these items currently, it is important to have a name and phone number clearly visible to show ownership or current registration numbers from the DMV. All property not clearly identified will be removed by Harbor Patrol.




### Staff Training

Harbor Patrol Officers have been putting in extra training this month with newly hired Reserve Officers doing all kinds of towing, search and rescue and night operations getting ready for the winter months. In addition, Harbor Patrol Officer Jacobs and Reserve Harbor Patrol Officer Maksoudian attended a 40-hour Marine Firefighting Class in Marina Del Rey with LA County Lifeguards on the Baywatch boats.



### First Storm

We enjoyed our first storm of the winter with a bit of rain, swell and wind, and the harbor entrance was posted with a Rough Bar Warning by the Coast Guard for the first time this winter season. Harbor Patrol assisted some of the anchored boats and dewatered many skiffs to prevent them from sinking. Although the storm flushed the streets and turned the bay water brown, the sunset at the end of the day brought delight to all sailors and land lubbers alike. We hope to see a lot more rain this winter!




### **Foghorn Update**

The United States Coast Guard Aids to Navigation Team has changed the foghorn activation at the Morro Bay Harbor Entrance to be user-activated now instead of the previous 24-7 cycle it was on. Foghorns coast-wide are being converted in this manner. Mariners needing foghorn assistance must now activate the sound signal by keying a standard VHF-FM radio FIVE times consecutively on channel 83A. The sound signal will then sound for 15 minutes following each activation.

### **Passing of a Morro Bay Legend**

Lastly and most importantly, we would like to remember and honor former Morro Bay Chief Harbor Patrol Officer Dick Rodgers, who recently passed away. Dick was a tremendous waterman, expert boat operator, intuitive emergency responder, and courageous leader. Before working for the City, Dick worked in the commercial boat-building industry in Morro Bay, in addition to tending hard-hat commercial abalone divers in the heyday of that industry. In the mid 1970's, Dick took a job with the City of Morro Bay back when the Harbor Patrol was a division of Public Works, both occupying the same small building that still houses the Harbor Department today. Dick worked during some of the most historical incidents the Harbor Patrol faced, including the devastating 1988 South T-Pier fire, and the 1983 capsizing of the San Mateo whale watching vessel by 20-foot breaking waves in the harbor entrance with 23 school children and nine adults aboard. All were successfully rescued due to the heroics of Dick, his fellow officers, and the Coast Guard. In 1995 Dick had a stroke and was unable to return to work, and for many years thereafter could be seen hiking across town to and from his North Morro Bay home with a backpack full of stones to rehabilitate himself physically. Dick came from the mold "when ships were made of wood and men were made of steel," all in a gracious and humble package – truly one of a kind. Thank you for your service and rest in peace, Dick, you will be fondly remembered and dearly missed.



## Public Works

### Utilities Division

The State Water project is the primary source of drinking water for the City of Morro Bay. Each year the State Water project shuts down for two to six weeks to enable maintenance of various systems and facilities. This year the shutdown is anticipated to run from October 31st until December 12th. During the shutdown, the City will use our groundwater wells from the Morro Valley. Due to the high level of nitrates in this aquifer, this water must be treated prior to distribution to the residents. The City treats this water at the Brackish Water Reverse Osmosis (BWRO) (pictured) treatment plant to remove the nitrates prior to distribution. The City will also, however, be receiving State Water via the Central Coast Water Authority (CCWA) during the evenings during this shutdown. Typically, the City uses the State Water Shutdown timing to perform preventative maintenance on our distribution system by using a method of “free chlorine” for disinfection. Because the City will be receiving the CCWA water in the evening, which uses Chloramines, the City will not be switching over to “free chlorine” at this time. Therefore, citizens should not notice a difference in their water taste or odor this year.



### Maintenance Division



Maintenance Staff recently had the honor and pleasure of landscaping and installing the new memory board at the Filipino Rock area. The Filipino Rock and the Memory Board serve to commemorate the landing of the first Filipinos in North America more than four and a half centuries ago on October 18, 1587. There was a rededication ceremony of the Filipino Rock on October 22nd held by the Filipino American National Historical Society California Central Coast Chapter. Several city staff and dignitaries were in attendance

at this event, including Morro Bay City Council.

## Engineering Division

---

The City's Directional Wayfinding Signage project started construction at the end of September and now is nearing completion. The \$200,000 project is being performed by Statewide Safety Services and has a total of 40 – 50 new wayfinding and parking signs throughout town to help orient community members and visitors to key landmarks, facilities, and parking areas throughout the City. Though the City's contract with Statewide Safety Services was signed in August of last year, construction was delayed due to supply chain issues for the materials to make the posts.

It has been almost 20 years since the last significant wayfinding signage project was completed. Funding for the project was budgeted entirely through the economic development fund, and it was combined effort of the Chamber of Commerce, Community Development Department, and Public Works Engineering teams for delivery of the project.



## WRF Program - Water Resources Center

---

FBV has essentially completed preparing the WRF wastewater treatment facilities (referred to as the Water Resources Center or WRC for short) for operation. Commissioning and start-up of wastewater facilities is in progress. Currently both the new WRC and the existing (old) WWTP are operating in parallel, as final equipment troubleshooting at the new WRC is on-going. The WRC is currently discharging effluent in compliance with the City's NPDES permit. The WRC has been receiving and treating approximately 90% of the City's sewer flows during the daytime for the past few weeks. The sewer flows are directed to the WRC around 8:00 a.m. each morning and reverted to the old WWTP around 9:00 p.m. each day. This will be done until reliable back up power and alarms are confirmed. Staff continues to fine tune the WRC in the meantime.

The effluent water quality leaving the WRC has been excellent and staff is very pleased with the WRC. City staff has moved into the facility's new Operations Building and Maintenance Building. FBV is also currently working on testing and commissioning vendor equipment related to the Indirect Potable Reuse (IPR) facilities including the Reverse Osmosis (RO), UV-AOP (Disinfection), and Calcite Treatment (pH control). Resolution of construction "punchlist" items is on-going as part of normal project closeout in anticipation of final project acceptance in advance of the State regulatory order deadline of February 2023.

## WRF Program - Conveyance

---

Anvil Builders and the City have commissioned into service the pipelines and pump stations, which are currently delivering raw sewage to the new WRC, and treated effluent to the City's existing ocean outfall. Anvil is now working on project closeout activities, including grading at the two pump station sites and the bike path, and is preparing for major restoration work and paving along the entire pipeline alignment. The City is anticipating major restoration work, including re-opening the bike path, to be mostly completed by early 2023.



## WRF Program - Recycled Water Facilities



Injection Well No. 1 construction and well development activities are complete and the step injection test was performed on Friday 10/14/22 with favorable results. Attached is a photo of the injection test manifold. The City had scheduled to start the extended injection test on October 31st, but decided to delay the test because the Central Coast Water Authority extended the State Water Project (SWP) Shutdown from 3 to 6 weeks. Running the injection test during the SWP shutdown would have placed additional stress on the City's water production facilities and City Staff during an already demanding time. The extended injection test is currently scheduled to start in mid-December and will allow the hydrogeologists to enhance the computer model of the groundwater basin, confirm injection rates and inform the design of the full-scale injection system. The Advanced Treatment Processes (i.e. Reverse Osmosis, Ultraviolet Disinfection/Advanced Oxidation) at the Water Resources Center are scheduled to perform validation

testing in December

### November 2022 General Election Update

The San Luis Obispo County Clerk's office continues to process last minute vote-by-mail and provisional ballots for the November election. As of Nov. 11, their office reported a total of 47,320 ballots remain to be counted and the next count will begin Wed., November 16<sup>th</sup> at 9:00am. Final results will be certified no later than December 8<sup>th</sup>; until that time, election results will continue to be updated [here](#). The newly elected

Morro Bay City Council will be seated at the December 13, 2022 Meeting.

## Finance Update

Finance staff is working on updating the Cost Allocation Plan. The new plan will be put into place effective July 1, 2023. The City's General Fund ended Fiscal Year 2021-22 with an operating surplus, meaning revenues exceeded expenditures for the period from July 2021 through June 2022, and no reserves were needed to balance the General Fund budget. Transient Occupancy Tax, Cannabis tax, business license, planning/permitting fee, and Recreation revenues increased over prior year. This General Fund operating surplus, as well as one-time federal funding, and Measure Q&E revenue, should allow the City Council to make targeted investments in priority areas, such as addressing unfunded liabilities (pension and other post-employment benefit costs), employee compensation, equipment, training, capital projects, etc.

## Human Resources Update

The City recently hired a new human resources manager, Rachael Hendricks. Rachel has a Master's in Public Administration with a Leadership focus and a Bachelor's in Psychology.

Rachael's career in human resources started at Oregon State University in employee training and development. Upon returning to California, she honed her human resources skills at the City of San Luis Obispo, working as a Human Resources Analyst for several years. Rachael then pivoted into the private sector, working as a Human Resources Manager for the last decade. She is excited to be back home in public service at the City of Morro Bay. Rachael is responsible for all aspects of resourcing humans, including duties that often seem to fall under "other duties as assigned," which enjoyably keeps her on her toes. Rachael lives in Los Osos with her husband Steve, daughter Zoë, and husky Kira. Rachel will lead the HR team, as they assist the City in the very important work in recruiting, retaining, training and developing our staff.


